Holy Week & Easter

By the time this newsletter is published, we will have begun our Holy Week journey with Palm Sunday. We will have watched the children process with palm leaves and remembered the triumphal entry into Jerusalem that commences Jesus' last week of life.

There will be no prayer service on Wednesday of this week, instead we will gather at 6pm on Maundy Thursday (April 1) in the sanctuary and

via livestream for worship. Worship will

include a meditation by Andrew, a children's time by Stephanie, special music, and the observance of the Lord's Supper. Congregants will be invited to come forward to receive the elements of communion from pastoral staff, who will be wearing both masks and gloves. We will be observing all recommended protocols from

our healthcare professionals, but if you do not feel comfortable taking communion in this way, you are welcome to bring your own elements (a grape and cracker) with you.

On Good Friday (April 2) we will gather at 6pm around the columbarium for a service of reflection about the last words of Jesus, with the

extinguishing of candles, as well as the singing of hymns, and prayer. We will be observing mask and distancing protocols. Participants are encouraged to bring a lawn chair and dress for comfort. In the event of rain, the service will not be held. Due to the outdoor nature of the event, it will not be livestreamed, but alternative options for Good Friday observance will be distributed electronicallγ.

> On Holy Saturday (April 3), the Flowering Cross will be positioned outside in front of the main doors to the sanctuary. You may bring any flowers you wish to contribute from 3:00 pm-5:00 pm that day or on Sunday morning before worship. Masks and social distancing will be observed for the safety of everyone.

> > Easter Sunday (April 4) Christ

is risen indeed! Worship at 10:30 am. The Flowering Cross will be available for individual and group pictures. The Easter Egg Hunt will take place after worship on the front lawn, followed by games and snacks for the kids. Masks and social distancing protocols will be observed for the safety of everyone.

Remembering David George by Linda Fields

How appropriate for David George early on a Sunday morning to enter the full presence of God, exemplifying his lifelong practice to worship wherever he was as he was able, in spirit and in truth.

We each have our stories with David George. My first encounter with David came through a letter Tim received welcoming him as new staff to the Christian Life Commission. David was a board member of the CLC. Of greater note to us 42 years later, was the invitation to visit Immanuel Baptist Church where David was pastor.

I had the honor of working with David George in the church office as church administrator from 1987 till the conclusion of his IBC pastorate in 2006. As a staff member, I observed him closely. Staff is key but at IBC, everyone counts. We are congregational, a reflection of David's leadership style.

David had the privilege and responsibility to enter people's lives in the most intimate times. We expected him to be there for us, without fail. Members were important to him. There are no lapses in service opportunities for the pastor—no place to hide except perhaps briefly in a study filled with books. He loved reading and studying and preparing. He loved sharing the good news, especially in a scholarly manner. When filing sermons, I noted he sometimes preached only from an index card with notes ("the proverbial sermon in the back pocket"); more often and particularly in sensitive topics, everything was typed and perfected because he wanted to be sure he said what he intended. He was always well organized. He referenced his sermons and articles through a card catalogue system, ready to share with others.

Broken hearts, broken bones, broken lives, weddings, funerals, births, burials, baptisms, hospital and home visitation—wherever we gathered David was there to lead us spiritually, to offer a scripture, a word of encouragement, a prayer, a listening ear. Prayer was a stronghold for David. His funeral services were uplifting and encouraging. He showed how purposeful and unique each person's life is.

A pastor is one who has to be jack of all trades, master of all or at least many trades. David was an example of Christian living. Whether it was spiritual disciplines or sermon preparation, he did it with excellence. He was a Baptist statesman and an ardent supporter of the pillars of Baptist doctrine. Denominational interests were part of his life, but he painstakingly made the jump when institutions no longer seemed to reign true to his doctrinal beliefs. He



was devoted to his Lord first. Missions and ministry were priorities. After retirement, he continued to follow his calling in interims in Texas and Tennessee.

He was actively involved with his family and community. He vigorously supported public schools and stood for tax support to be equitable. Education was valued. David and Peggy loved football games at their children's Hillsboro High School. A Baylor football game, a movie with friends, a book or a dinner gathering with others ensured a good time.

David was mentor to many including staff—neophytes, some still in college or seminary, as well as seasoned ministerial staff. Always ready to teach, to counsel, to encourage, he had a heart particularly for those entering the ministry. The staff, varying in skills and abilities, have always been team. David was never pushy, but he wanted us to do our best. At one time I counted 27 ordained ministers in the church membership which might seem intimidating. David made himself available to those ministers in the church; he was "the pastor's pastor." Even with his towering height, he did not elevate himself above them. He was always ready to listen and exchange ideas. He often said we hammer our lives on the anvil of doubt and questions; yet Christ and truth prevail.

One day I watched as he adjusted and then again repositioned a lamp shade in his office after working hard on a document. I told him, referring to the document as well as the lamp, "You know it doesn't have to be perfect to be good." He looked around,

smiled and concurred. He lived life that way--attempting perfection, but okay to move on. Actually, he had first used that phrase on me; hence I loved the chance to "get him back."

David wasn't all work and no play! On occasion he would go visit a member of the church family at what is now St. Thomas Midtown and stop at the Krispy Kreme on the way back to church to bring the staff a dozen donuts. However, usually by the time he got back to the church, there would be only *eight* donuts in the box . . .

David, the scholar and theologian, shared Karl Barth's theological summation in the profound statement, "Jesus loves me, this I know." In his dying, David showed us how to live—in trust and faith. He recently re-read and reflected on John Baillie's A Diary of Private Prayer. He wrote an Easter meditation in the final weeks of his life. He lived life abundantly as it merged into eternal life.

We have called him pastor emeritus since 2006. We carry on, as one of David's favorite songs proclaims, "we love Him and seek Him, we long to be near Him, and rest in the light of His beautiful land."2 David's love for The Pilgrim's Progress surely shines brighter, allowing him evermore to worship his creator in the anticipated Celestial City.3


