The Weather Report

A guest in worship recently asked me, "What kind of Baptist is this church?" Without pause, I said, "General." The look of confusion led me to offer a description of our present denominational status.

Roger Williams' tenure as a Baptist was brief. Desiring to bring himself closer to God, he sought to return to worship with an eye for a form of worship most like early Christianity. He ended up with a group of believers who eventually became known as "Particular Baptists." Finding no support of infant baptism in scripture, Williams flat out rejected this practice. This belief and this belief only distinguished the Particular Baptists from the Puritans in the area. Like his Puritan neighbors, Williams and the Particular Baptists retained the belief that God predestined a select few for salvation.

Many or most modern Baptists do not hold to any form of predestination. We believe the good news of Jesus Christ is preached openly and to anyone who will give an ear. Those who repent and confess Jesus as Lord receive the gift of salvation. Our Baptist forefathers/foremothers were known as "General Baptists" because of this belief. As a side note, despite the shared belief in predestination, the Puritans evidenced disdain for the Particular Baptists, creating quite a commotion. Biographer John Barry writes, "Within a few months and with the deepest of regret, he (Williams) therefore abandoned the Baptist church, casting himself loose."¹

The guest in worship seemed satisfied with my lengthier answer to the question. They returned for worship on a following Sunday and shared their contact information. If present on Sunday August 8, they will have the opportunity to witness our General Baptist leaning in practice.

The baptism of Melissa Clouse is scheduled for worship on the second Sunday in August. As a child of this church, Melissa has been nurtured in the love of God, the teachings of Scripture, and has repeatedly exhibited a keen grasp of the message of Jesus Christ. Presenting herself for believer's baptism several Sundays back was a natural progression of an experience initiated at her dedication in September 2011. Like you, my heart was warmed by her courageous demonstration of her love for God.

As to the notion that God would save only a tiny minority of sinners and send the rest to hell, I am overly grateful to the General Baptists. I, we, owe much to these brothers and sisters who dared believe that all who had faith in Christ would be saved. Rather than defending an argument, they lived a belief. This was most fortunate given any understanding of the gift of salvation transcends the limitations of human thought anyway!

General Baptists hold dear certain freedoms. One such freedom has been termed "Soul Freedom." Roger Williams in time arrived at a belief he would call "Soul Libertie." The belief that every individual has the right and responsibility to deal with God with no interference from creed or government. Some in his day found his views so dangerous that they sought to banish him, threatening to hang him. As we witness our sister Melissa's baptism, let us pause to consider the gravitas of the moment.

Recommended Changes to IBC Bylaws

The Polity and Procedure Committee is recommending revisions to the bylaws which were last updated in 2017. As the committee reviewed this document in recent months, they realized that several actions previously approved by the church had not been incorporated into the bylaws. During COVID, we discovered that provisions need to be specified for times when the church family is not able to meet in person.

The summary of changes with brief explanations includes:

1. Items previously approved but never ratified as a bylaw.

2. Items approved but never included in the bylaws.

3. Additions to the bylaws.

Online Giving Options Now Available

With the adoption of Realm software for the purpose of managing congregational information and financial transactions, a further benefit to church members is available.

Realm offers online and mobile giving options to Immanuel members and friends. An important note: online and mobile giving DOES NOT replace any of our previous giving options. You may still give tithes and offerings in the form of cash or check. You may also continue to use online bill pay to schedule your gifts monthly. In fact, these forms of giving (cash, check, or online bill pay) continue to be the most costefficient sources of income for the church, as Immanuel does not incur any transaction fees with these types of contributions.

Online and mobile giving provide additional opportunities to conveniently give, especially for those wanting to make a one-time or special gift. Budget line items available for this type of giving include the Budget Offering, Library Gifts, Memorial Flowers, Memorial Gifts, and Building Maintenance. If you choose this method of giving, we ask, if you are able, to check the box labeled "Contribute an extra \$_____ to offset processing costs." The processing cost amount is a percentage of the amount you give. Credit cards transactions require 3% of the total gift and ACH (Debit) transactions require 1.5% of the total gift to process. By choosing to offset processing costs, you ensure the church will not have to set aside funds for this purpose.

You may access online giving through the church's website, ibcnashville.org, by clicking the "Contribute" button, the far-left option on the site's menu bar at the top of the page. This button will take you to a page through which you can log on to your Realm account, find instructions for giving via text, or be directed to a giving form via the "Give Now" button.
