The Weather Report

On the seventh Wednesday before Easer and the first day of Lent, Christians around the world receive the imposition of ashes on their foreheads or the back of their hands. Ashes derived from the burning of the palm branches from the previous Holy Week are used to make a paste-like substance to be applied to the skin in the form of a cross.

In New Orleans, the weeks building up to Ash Wednesday are filled with Mardi Gras parades. During Carnival, the population of the city swells. New to the parade scene, I learned the ropes from one seasoned veteran. Commonsensically they said, "Where you are standing at a parade determines what you see and hear."

Where you stand in the spiritual geography of your life may determine what mysterious power the season of Lent will hold for you and for me this year. If you are firmly planted in the twenty-four-hour time of commerce, you likely will miss Lent's gift – a withdrawal from convenience. In an age when we read the message at the moment of its conception in the mind of the sender and dinner is delivered to your door, we intentionally seek wilderness.


> Accustomed to having whatever your need or fancy available at one's fingertips, we are likely to read past the action of our Lord in those first Forty Days. Jesus withdrew to a lonely place. He fell of the map of public life and sought what Sallie McFague terms "wildness." "Wildness is not the same as wilderness. 'Wildness' is a place to be visited on its own terms; it is not necessarily a vast track of land, but a place available for exploration." For forty days and nights, Jesus fasted and prayed as he explored

Ash Wednesday calls us to remember we are dust. The source of much worry and sorrow is the illusion that we are anything but finite creatures. We live with an insatiable hunger for autonomy and significance. We make plans as if we are the author of our lives rather than narrator. Withdrawing for a season, we have the opportunity to clear out and clean off the space meant for the indwelling of God. Only then does our dust become splendor.

Through the primacy of touch, we begin our exploration of the kingdom of heaven on its terms. Lent begins with a touch, and in turn, calls us to be in touch with others and in turn touched by them. To be in touch with the place where we live, and the gift of what time we have on earth. To be in touch with the Spirit of God who seeks to dwell within us.

Our Best Giving Is an Expression of Gratitude and Trust

Churches and charitable organizations need money. Buildings must be maintained, workers paid, and programs funded. Ongoing activities seemingly demand a constant promotion of giving. With this backdrop, does it matter why we give? Are some motivations better for our souls and the nurturing of a life-sustaining faith?

Some suitors for our gifts draw upon our pride, recognizing our desire to be seen as generous persons to ourselves and those around us. Others appeal to our greed, promising that the more we give the more God will bless us materially. Others manipulate our guilt with the subtle assurance that a larger contribution will ease a troubled conscience and secure God's favor. Still others tap into our fear, implying that a generous spirit might ward off bad things from happening. All of these are appealing to our future self-interest, urging us to give so we can get.

Many churches use these "give so we can get" enticements in varying combinations. They work. But are these appeals consistent with the grace-based faith we traditionally espouse? "Give so we can get" assumes God's favor can be earned or bought, cultivating a works-based faith.

How might a grace-based giving differ? Rooted in gratitude, it begins with experiences of unmerited grace personally received, connecting these to a loving God who is ever-giving in response to need. As an additional grace, we see God's provision in the resources of the world, the people that have touched our individual lives, and the talents, skills, and opportunities we have individually received. This recognition sparks a heartfelt gratitude alongside trust in the God that loves through giving. Our own giving becomes an expression of gratitude, trust, and faith as we get to become God's hands and feet, joyfully joining God in giving, responding to needs around us. When our giving expresses our gratitude and trust, it nurtures life-sustaining faith in us even as it contagiously invites those around us to join with us, bringing their gifts, all together responding to need.

The Stewardship Committee is grateful for the faithful giving of our Immanuel community supporting the ministries of our church. Nine months into the church year, our giving exceeds expenses. Thanks be to God!
