THE WEATHER REPORT

Captain Meriwether Lewis and Lieutenant George Clark were co-commanders of the Corps of Discovery. The two were charged by President Thomas Jefferson with the mission of finding an all-water route to the Pacific. Despite a tragic ending, Meriwether Lewis was truly a national hero.

Tod Bolsinger sees a driving metaphor for our present moment in history in the story of the Corps of Discovery. "In a very brief time our world has become volatile, uncertain, complex and ambiguous," he writes. Lewis and Clark were packing canoes when they discovered mountains in lieu of an all-water route to the Pacific. Sitting on the crest of Lemhi Pass, Captain Lewis realized they had entered uncharted territory.

The numbers on the Western church's steady decline are widely circulated. Canadian born Charles Taylor is a most insightful thinker on the broad subject of the development of "Western Christendom." He aptly frames the challenge facing the Christian church today with a question. "One way to put the question is this: why was it virtually impossible not to believe in God, in, say, 1500 in our Western society, while in 2000 many of us find this not only easy, but even inescapable?"2

There is a fascinating parallel to be made between the present day Christian church and Lewis and Clark and the Corps of Discovery. Equipped to navigate an all-water route to the Pacific, the Corps of Discovery discovered mountains upon mountains; they had to rethink the way forward. The canoes were rendered useless. Horses were needed. Forging relationships with local Indians in order to purchase horses became paramount. Sacagawea was invaluable in the forging of such relations.

The success of the mission hinged on the adaptability of the leaders. When known solutions proved inept, Lewis and Clark showed a resolve to look at deeper questions of purpose and context. They learned to lead form the position of "we don't know." As leaders, they sought and valued the input from all participants. They voted. The late Stephen Ambrose notes the significance. "This was the first vote ever held in the Pacific Northwest. It was the first time in American history that a black slave had voted, the first time a woman had voted."3

Presently, the associate pastor search committee is diligently at work. The job description for this position has been slightly revised to include an emphasis on growth. The committee has talked with candidates about Immanuel's desire to increase participation in the church's mission. The conversations have been candid and honest. I have listened intently.

The Christian church, Immanuel Baptist Church specifically, finds itself in uncharted territory. Many of you have asked some form of the following question: "What can we do to keep our churches from dying?" Despite his own ambivalence about Christian faith, Jefferson's resolve may inspire us moving forward. As Jefferson trusted a younger Meriwether Lewis, might we inspire the younger generation to go where we have not gone? Tod Bolsinger writes to churches asking the aforementioned question. "I would say, Focus on your own transformation together, not on your church dying. Focus on the mountains ahead, not the rivers behind. Focus on continually learning, not what you have already mastered."4






Update from the Search Committee


