Ascension & Pentecost

After the hustle and bustle of Easter, it is easy to feel like the pinnacle of the spring season has come and gone, but there are still great things to come in the church year: Ascension and Pentecost.

The Ascension occurs on the 40th day after Easter (always on a Thursday).

In a lovely symmetrical move, the church calendar balances the 40 days we wandered with Jesus in

the dessert during Lent with 40 days that celebrate Jesus' resurrection appearances to the disciples and other followers. On Ascension Day, we remember that Jesus returned to heaven from the Mount of Olives after his post-resurrection time on earth. The followers of Jesus had the ecstasy of spending time with the risen Christ, only to have to say goodbye to him a little over a month later. They had to find a way to let him go, but this time it was different. Jesus' departure at the Ascension was not another death: It came not only with a sense of loss but also of expectation. Jesus promised never to leave them (or us). Jesus instructed his followers to prepare for the coming of the Holy Spirit, a new manifestation of divine power and presence that they and the world had never before experienced. They just needed to wait.

Acts 1:12–14 tells us that the disciples returned to Jerusalem to the upstairs room where they were staying (perhaps the same room where they had eaten the Passover meal together before Jesus' death). The 11 remaining disciples gathered there along with a group of women, Mary, the mother of Jesus, and the brothers of Jesus. They waited and prayed together, anticipating what would happen next. At this time, Jews from many different parts of the world were gathered in Jerusalem for the Feast of Weeks, also called Pentecost, day 50 after Passover (the Greek word for 50 is *pente*). In Hebrew, this occasion is called Shavu'ot, which originated as a time to give thanks for the grain harvest. God ordained this practice in Leviticus 23:15–22.

Because Acts tells us that the Holy Spirit descended upon the disciples and others who were gathered for the celebration of the Feast of Weeks, Christians also adopted the Greek name associated with this day, Pentecost. For Christians, Pentecost takes place 50 days after Easter.

Acts 2:1–3 reports that on Pentecost Day a sound of rushing wind suddenly filled the entire house where the disciples were staying. Individual flames of fire appeared above the heads of each one, signaling the arrival of the Holy Spirit. Followers of Jesus began to speak in other languages as the Spirit enabled them to speak. Those who observed this phenomenon and came to (Continued on pg. 7)

A Note about worship Music May 5

On May 5, the choir will present the Tennessee premiere of a new work for choir titled "Abide in God" by composer Terre Johnson. Dr. Johnson is the director of the school of music at Georgia Southern University and is an influential church musician, conductor, and educator.

The music was commissioned through the efforts of the Love Like Lily Foundation (<u>lovelikelily.org</u>), Tim and Jen Powell's family foundation, established in memory of their late daughter Lily Kate. She died in 2017 in a tragic car accident a week before her 10th birthday.

The Foundation was established to provide fine arts lessons to deserving students in Augusta, GA, to commission a new choral work every two years in her memory, and to work closely with other non-profits, such as Habitat for Humanity and Georgia State University's Children's Health Law Clinic, to help those in need.

This year's specific commission was funded by memorial gifts given in memory of Tim's mom Debra Powell, who passed away in 2023 after a five year battle with ovarian cancer. She sang in her church choir, and one of her favorite choral pieces was also composed by Terre Johnson.

Program and Lunch with Davidson County Sheriff Daron Hall

"Drug Challenges & Mental Health" Tuesday, June 11th 11:00 AM

Daron Hall was elected to his sixth term as Davidson County sheriff in 2022. He made Nashville history by being the youngest person ever elected to the office and is now the longest serving. Sheriff Hall's tenure has focused on arresting the problem, not the person. He designed and implemented the first-of-its-kind Behavioral Care Center, a diversion program aimed at decriminalizing mental illness.

Sheriff Hall was elected as president of two national associations and is the only Tennessee sheriff to serve as president of the National Sheriffs' Association. He was also elected the 101st president of the American Correctional Association. Hall has won numerous awards, including the prestigious E. R. Cass Award – the highest honor given in the corrections profession.

After 35 years of criminal justice experience, Sheriff Hall is seen as an expert in the field. He has been interviewed by national and international media outlets, including the Wall Street Journal, the British Broadcasting Corporation, NPR, the New York Times, Fox News, CNN, and Fortune Magazine.

have a look for themselves couldn't believe that Galileans abruptly began speaking the languages of so many different groups!

Peter told the crowds that what they had witnessed fulfilled what the prophet Joel foretold, "Your sons and daughters will prophesy; your young will see visions, your elders will dream dreams. Even upon my servants, men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy" (Acts 2:17–18; cf. Joel 2:28-32).

On Pentecost, we recognize the beginning of a new community made up of Jesus followers. The Holy Spirit made it possible to share the story of the gospel with bystanders, who become the earliest members of the church. People from many different backgrounds, cultures, and languages quickly became siblings in this burgeoning faith. Because the Holy Spirit first appears on Pentecost, and the first group of people request baptism in response, Pentecost is often called the birthday of the church.

We group the event of Jesus' Ascension with Pentecost because, without the Ascension, there can be no Pentecost. Jesus had to depart the earth for the last time before the Holy Spirit could descend. Jesus, in his bodily form, had to leave his followers before they could become the body of Christ so that the church could be born.
