As Christians, we observe Advent beginning with the 4th Sunday preceding Christmas, waiting with anticipation for the coming of the Christ Child. Christmas doesn't begin until December 25 and traditionally it lasts until January 6 when many celebrate the arrival of the magi. New Year's Eve/Day forms the midpoint of the season.

In days of yore, the Christian Feast of the Incarnation (Christmas) initiated two weeks of partying in the middle of winter when there wasn't as much agricultural work to do. For some the party continued (off and on) through Carnival season (Mardi Gras) and finally ended with Ash Wednesday. In our contemporary context, most of us have wrapped up our celebrations before we reach January 6.

Gratitude: Say out loud one thing you are thankful for each day.


Nature: Take a walk one time per week and notice the beauty of creation.

Deacon Nomination Process Begins Jan 15th



The three-week period for nominating deacons to replace those completing their current terms begins January 16. During that time all Immanuel members will have the opportunity to nominate up to four members to "assist the church in the accomplishment of its total mission."

• Deacon Role and Function:

Collecting the offering, serving the Lord's Supper, and looking after a deacon care group may be the most noticeable services they perform, but according to our Bylaws, the active deacons also work with the pastor and staff "with the goal of guiding the church and its members in worship, in service and ministry, and in effective use of the church's personal and corporate resources." They also serve "as advisors to the congregation, pastor, and staff in all areas of the church's life. They plan, review, evaluate, and recommend to the congregation proposals for improving the effectiveness of the church's worship, witness, education, ministry, and fellowship."

• Nomination forms (ballots):

Shortly before January 15, deacon nomination forms will be distributed at church and by email. Anyone who needs to have a form sent by mail should contact the church office. For quick reference, a list of resident church members who, as of January 15, are eligible to serve as deacon will be distributed with the nomination forms. The same list will be posted

on the bulletin board beside the library. (For a more complete discussion of qualifications, see Article III Section 6 of the Bylaws at right.)

Nomination period:

Nominations may be submitted anytime from Sunday, January 15, through Sunday noon, February 12. After prayerful consideration, all members are asked to recommend up to four people they believe to be best qualified. Each member should fold the unsigned nomination form, place it in an envelope, then seal the envelope, print his/her name on the outside, and drop it in one of the two ballot boxes (near the church office and near the library), place it in the Sunday morning offering plate, or mail it to the church office in time to be received no later than Friday, February 10. Forms may also be submitted on Sunday, February 12, until noon.

• Tabulation:

A tabulating committee composed of outgoing deacons will check names to be sure the voter is a member, separate ballots from envelopes so that privacy is ensured, then unfold ballots and prepare a list of nominees ranked according to number of nominations received. The church administrative staff will pass the resulting list of nominees to the Committee on Deacons. The Committee on Deacons will contact the nominees, in order of nominations received, asking them to consider serving for three years beginning May 1, and inviting them to meet with the Committee before accepting or declining. A slate of four nominees who have accepted the call to serve will be presented for approval at the annual business meeting in April.

• Please pray for God's guidance for this significant church-life process. From your Committee on Deacons: Lerma Hearn, Debbie Maxwell, and Ed Wasserman.

Article III, Section 6 of Bylaws Eligibility and Qualification of Deacons.

To be eligible for service as a deacon of Immanuel Baptist Church, persons at the time the deacon ballots are distributed pursuant to Article V, Section 2 of these bylaws shall: (1) be a resident member of Immanuel Baptist Church; (2) be at least twenty-five years of age; (3) have been a member of Immanuel Baptist Church for at least one year; (4) have actively participated in the life of the church, by being a member of a church committee or being elected to a church office (i.e., treasurer, Sunday School teacher, etc.), at some point within the three years preceding their nomination; and (5) have financially supported the church, either personally or through their family giving unit, during each year of their membership or during each of the three years preceding their nomination, whichever period of time is shorter. Deacons should reflect those qualities that the church expects of its members including regular church attendance and financial support of the church. Persons nominated to serve as deacons should also agree to commit their time to serve a deacon care group, to attend deacons' meetings regularly, and to study carefully the teachings of scripture before agreeing to serve. They also should examine the church covenant as an expression of what the church calls each of its members to be and to do.

Mid-Year Stewardship Report

What a gift and privilege it is for all of us to share in this mission. We have much for which to be grateful. Our community of faith nurtures the faith in all of us—from the youngest to the oldest among us. We have several adults who grew up in this community of faith from childhood. Some of these have grandchildren here who now bring their own energy, enthusiasm, and faith to our work together.

Learning together, growing together, and working together—

we reach out to each other, to the marginalized in the Nashville area, and to the wider world.

Our gifts and investments in this community continue to provide educational curriculum, building maintenance, mission resources, utility and insurance payments, staff salaries, and indeed all that is required to fulfill our ongoing mission as God's church at Immanuel.

The Stewardship Committee wanted to give a status report to the church after seven months into the fiscal year. From May through November 30, we are about break even with our income exceeding expenses by a mere \$248. This is an improvement over a couple of months ago when we had a deficit.



Through this season of Advent, Christmas and into the new year, may we deepen our individual and collective participation in God's joyful dance of giving, receiving, and giving again with trust.

Reminder: all gifts intended to be credited in calendar year 2022 must be in church office or postmarked by December 31, 2022.
